Memorandum

The will of
John Shaplin.

hat on or about the nine and twentieth day of August 1641 John Shaplin late of Stotter in the County of Suffolk yeoman being sick in body but of perfect minde memory and understandyng did with an intention to dispose of his goodes and estate declare and make his last will and testament unto his wife Elizabeth Shaplin on the like day in effect wryt that he would not make any will in writing but that his wife Elizabeth should have all his estate at her disposing for that he was bound by bond to his minde and his said wife to leave her mouth 200 hundred pounds And therfore desired her to pay her selfe out of the said estate And further he willed that his debts being satisfied the remainder of his said estate should be disposed of amongst his said three children which are not provided for which goods he spake with the minde and intention that the same should stand for and be his last will and testament unto his wife in the presence of divers credible witnesses Robert Shaplin signum John Shaplin fest.

The eight day of November in the yere of our Lord God one thousand six hundred fiftie one there issued forth a Commission to Elizabeth Shaplin the Relict of the said deceased to administer the goodes chattells and debts of the said deceased according to the tenor and effect of his will mentioned abovewritten for that there being no executor named therein shal be first by vertue of a Commission legally seconde with and faithfully to administer the same Ex.

The thirteenth, fourteenth day of December in the four and twentieth yere of the Raigne of our Soveraigne Lord Charles by the grace of god King of England Scotland France and Ireland Defender of the faith etc Anno d[omi]ni 1648. I. M. William Folkepeye of Mylifford in the County of Kent Barone being of sound and perfect minde desirous to sett my estate in such good order that after my decease there may be noe contradictione therein doe hereby make and ordaine this my last will and testament in manner and forme following first I bequeath my soule into the hands of god my creator to Jesus Christ my Redemeer and to the holy ghost my comforter not doubting but to be numbered amongst the elect saintes of god by and through the only incurrende death and mercitorie sacrifice of my only Salvior Jesus Christ And I appoint my body to be buried in the chancell of the parish church of Mylifford aforesaid neare the tombes of my deceased father and mother And touching my worldy goodes whiche my trusty god of his bounteys mercie hath liberally bestowed vpon me I will and bequeath the same in manner and forme following first I will and bequeath to the poore of the parish of Mylifford forty shillings to be distributed amongst them at my funerall by my executors hereafter named Item a trte and bequeath to each of my children bothe male and female that shall be living at the time of my decease temporally a peice of lawfull mony of England to be paid unto them by mine executors hereafter named within one month next after my decease Item I give and bequeath to my loving wife Dame Helen and her heire for ever all that my Messuage and lande called Bogges with the appurtenances situate and being in the parish of East Walling in the said County of Kent and now or late in the tenure or occupation of widow Streetfeild Item further give unto my said loving wife and her heire for ever one hundred or yearly rent of thirty shillings and four pence whiche I haue issuing out of certaine lands lying at

Bopley in the County aforesaid heretofore the inheritance of John Brewerton gent
and granted by John his son unto John Doldeperyn the father and John &
John Doldeperyn the sonne of me the said William Doldeperyn Item & give
and bequeath unto my said wife good wife Dame Weston and her heire and
assigne for ever all my lands tenements rents and hereditaments with
theire and every of their appurtenances hereafter mentioned and I do witness that
is to say all that my Mannor of Blatchenden with the appurtenances in the
parish of Headstone in the County aforesaid and all other my Messuages
lands and tenements with all and singular their appurtenances in Headstone
aforesaid whiche are or late nowe in the seuerall tenures or occupations of
Henry Dabbe Robert Whatman and Richard Kinge and now of John &
Bishop and John Dabbe of their aymee ffarmes or Under tenementes And
all other my Messuages lands and tenements whatsoeuer in Headstone
aforesaid to have and to hold the the said Mannor of Blatchenden with
the appurtenances and all other the said diversified Messuages lands and
tenements in Headstone East Malling and Bopley aforesaid unto my said wife and her
wife her heire and assigne for ever here in my will and inuiding is that the said
Dame Weston my wife shall and may hold and iny all that my Mannor of Blatchenden and
all other my Messuages lands tenements woodes and hereditaments whatsoeuer which for
heretofore upon marriage toweyed and assynd to my said wife for her tenement the
same to be had and holden unto her in such manner and forme as by the same they
are setted and toweyed. And as touching all and singular my other exisitg good
thatello real and personall debto bille bondes specialties ready money plate arreables
household stiffe and implemēnts of heres trespasy my debto legatis and funerall
expences first discharged satisfid and paid to me and bequeath unto my said deare
and loving wife Dame Weston Doldeperyn whom also I ordaine and appoint my
sole and whole executors of this my last will and testament. And reuoking all former
will by me made dec published and declare the present writing constynt of true
shrewe of paper to the forme wherof I have subscrive my name and to this last my
hand and seale have sett the day and yere first above written But the presence of
those whose names are hereafter subscrive vix Richard Doldeperyn Jr. Bast and
Margaret Beaven Mrs. Doldeper.

This will was proved before William Blaunt Doctor of Law and Surgeon
of St. Thomas's Buent Ruyff and also Doctor of Law Master or keeper of the
Inquisition Court the fifth day of November in the yere of our Lord God one
thousand six hundred fiftie one by the oath of Dame Weston Doldeperyn the Teste of
the said deceased and executors named in the said will to whom was committed
Administration of all and singular the goodes thatello and debto of the said deceased
she being first legally sowne well and truly to administer the same. *wp*

in the parish church of Chappell le ffirth. To for my worldly goodes I give and
bequeath in manner and forme following vix first my will and minde is that
my furell appurtenances be discharged out of my whole goodes Item & give and
bequeath vix to William Astor my naturall sonne the summe of eighty-
